



School Context

The Australian International Academy has its beginnings in 1983 in Coburg, Melbourne, acquiring its Strathfield campus in 2006. The international focus of the academy has attracted parents and students with the IB PYP, MYP and DP programs supporting this focus, alongside the NSW NESA curriculum.

The Strathfield Campus occupies a heritage site of considerable local historical and cultural significance, ideally geographically situated near the community the school serves. The centrality of the school as well as its accessibility via public transportation has attracted both parents and students to the school. The relatively small size of the school has resulted in close knit and enduring relationships with teachers keenly aware of each student, as an individual learner, allowing for effective pastoral care and individualized student learning. The school's values, deeply rooted in its Islamic faith, valuing care, compassion, hard work and recognizing the potential in every student, attracts both potential students and parents.

The school located in inner west of Sydney draws much of its student body from the surrounding suburbs, though some may commute longer distances to attend school. Students come from families that typically place a premium on academic success, an Islamic education and values, and on the physical and emotional wellbeing of their children. The school, through its scholarship initiatives, has successfully attracted and retained students who have demonstrated excellence in academic and religious studies as well as students with exceptional sporting achievements. The school maintains an inclusive comprehensive enrolment policy that accepts students across the social and academic spectrum. The students at the Australian International Academy, come from a wide range of national, cultural and linguistic backgrounds.

The staff at the Australian International Academy are committed and caring professionals, who are passionate about providing inclusive education to a diverse range of the students. The staff, being part of a small school, often take on additional responsibilities in an effort to provide the needed support to the students and to enrich their education through co-curricula and pastoral activities, such as interschool sports, STEM clubs, debating, interfaith programs, year level camps, fund raising drives and involvement in local community service and leadership programs. All our staff are required to be registered with NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA) to teach in NSW and are accredited as either Conditional, Provisional, Proficient, Highly Accomplished or Lead teachers.

To develop graduates who are well prepared and self motivated to advance Australia and to participate effectively as world citizens with Muslim values.

Our aim is to provide quality education in a caring and supportive Islamic faith environment. We encourage our students to aim for personal excellence and to develop skills for independent learning and critical thinking. We utilise a variety of programs to promote self-esteem, self-discipline, responsibility and leadership.

We aim to foster in our graduates, an awareness of interdependence as members of a multicultural community and the world, and to develop in them a sense of service as well as a commitment to act with justice and compassion.

Developing well prepared graduates and citizens with Muslim values





The Australian International Academy's educational programme is well balanced between a secular curriculum and an Islamic curriculum. Students are taught to be proud of their cultural and religious identity. The basic language of instruction for all subjects is English, however the Academy recognises the value and benefit of bilingualism and multilingualism, therefore student will study a second language.

Teaching and learning allows students to benefit in their spiritual and academic development while growing in self-esteem, in a caring and multicultural environment, that celebrates diversity.

Although the Academy welcomes and accepts students and staff from non-Islamic backgrounds, students and staff, guidance is provided by the Academy to ensure that the Islamic ethos of the school is respected and maintained.

Co-Curricular



Student Involvement

There is a high expectation that all students will make the effort to become a part of the AIA School community. There are many opportunities for students to develop a strong sense of belonging through our co-curricular programs.

There are many extra-curricular activities that occur after school. These activities generally require parental consent and usually require the parental organisation of transportation.



Student Representative Council (SRC) and Peer Support

The student body collectively elects its student leaders, which include SRC members, prefects as well as Captains and Vice Captains. Students are encouraged to develop leadership qualities through the Captaincy team and SRC. Student representatives meet regularly, advocating on behalf of the students, organising and planning student led activities, representing the students and the school at community events and ceremonies.

A program of peer mentoring and support is an integral part of student life in both the high school and the primary school, with senior students, given training and the responsibility of engaging with their juniors in delivering programs aimed at fostering social and emotional wellbeing.



Clubs and After school activities

Afterschool Sport: Running twice a week, students are given the opportunity to engage in organised physical activity afterschool.

Chess Club: The Chess Club meets once a week, where students develop their thinking and strategical skills, under the guidance of our chess coordinator. Typically this occurs on a Wednesday afternoon. Students also represent the school in inter school chess on Friday afternoons.

Homework Club: Is provided for students after school to support their learning in all subjects. Homework club runs weekly from 3.30 to 4.20 pm

Morning Quran Classes: Students have the opportunity to extend their mastery of Quran memorisation and recitation through the weekly morning Quran classes run by our qualified Islamic studies teachers.

Debating Teams: Students throughout the high school are given the opportunity to join the debating team, where students receive training in the finer art of rhetoric, argumentation and communication by a dedicated debating coordinator. Students then regularly represent the school in interschool debating competitions.

Religious and Values Education



The Australian International Academy understands the importance of values education for the growth of every male and female.

Students learn about values throughout the curriculum, which places emphasis on character development and a value driven life. The AIA provides structured programmes which allows for ample expression of core values such as cooperation, honesty, humility, peace, responsibility, respect, and dignity.

Islamic and Quranic Studies

All students from K - 10 have timetabled Quran and Islamic studies classes, alongside their academic studies. Islamic and Quran Studies are taught by qualified Islamic studies teachers, using current - evidence based pedagogical methods.

Religious events and activities

As a Muslim school, the Academy celebrates the various religious occasions that occur throughout the year, like Eid and Ramadan. Events like communal Iftars are organised for teachers and students to promote the celebration of faith and Muslim Identity.

Umrah

The school organises annual opportunity for students in year 10 to perform the Umrah (lesser pilgrimage) to Mecca, Saudi Arabia, as part of its commitment to religious education.


The Australian International Academy has a long and proud association with the International Baccalaureate Organisation, being authorised to deliver THREE different programmes at the Strathfield Campus, namely


- Primary Years Programme (PYP)






Curriculum Framework
